I would like to draw your attention to two documents that are going to be provided with this newsletter. The first is a proposal regarding the current proceedings to be published as a scientific journal. This is something that the New Zealand Society of Animal Production has been considering for some time. The Management Committee believe that the timing is right for this to happen and a motion will be put forward by members of the Management Committee at the AGM being held on 28th June, at the Distinction Hotel in Rotorua. As stated in the Society's Guidelines "At any meeting of the Society or of the Management Committee, matters shall be decided by a majority vote of those present in person at the meeting". So the motion will be voted on at the AGM and, if required, the name for the Journal will also be voted on by show of hands. Please read the proposal. Time will be allowed for discussion of the proposal at the AGM. If you have discussion points that you would like to contribute, but are unable to attend the AGM, please put your considerations into writing and arrange for a proxy to provide your discussion at the AGM however, the Guidelines do not allow for a proxy vote.

Speaking of Guidelines, the second document relates to the Society's Guidelines. The NZSAP Guidelines are our "rules" and provide guidance on how the Society operates. It has come to my attention that there has not been a full review of the Society's Guidelines since 2008. There has been much change in how the Society operates over the last 9 years, including some new awards. So the Guidelines need to be updated to reflect this. Also I was flabbergasted to see reference to "his" or "he" when talking about members of the Society or the Management committee. Many minor changes in the Guidelines included ensuring the wording was gender neutral and also defining the roles of the Executive vs. Minutes Secretary when the role is listed as "Secretary". Chris Logan and I spent a whole day working through the Guideline documents and updating them as required. Because I am now très au fait with the Guidelines I can tell you "the rules of the Society may be altered, added to or rescinded at any general meeting of the Society" so the updates made to the Guidelines will be put forward as a motion for ratification at the AGM. In order to make it clear what the changes requiring ratification are, I have compiled a document outlining the old vs. new wording which is provided along with this newsletter. There will also be opportunity to discuss the amendments to the Guidelines at the AGM.

As with any Society, voting privileges at general meetings are only for those members that are financial i.e., have paid their subscription. So, please consider this a reminder that you need to have paid your subscription to the Society by now! 

TRAVEL REPORT FOR ANIMAL SCIENCE AWARD Lydia Farrell, Science Intern, DairyNZ/AgResearch

The joint New Zealand and Australian Animal Production Science Conference in July of 2016 was the first experience I had attending a conference. This was also my first opportunity to present research findings and I presented some of the research project from my Honours degree entitled "Urine volumes of non-lactating dairy cows in late gestation fed forage based diets in winter". The opportunity to listen to and interact with many researchers was incredibly valuable to me at this early stage of my career. I am sincerely grateful to the New Zealand Society of Animal Production for granting me this travel award so that I could attend.

The conference occurred during the time I was an intern working in an animal behaviour and welfare research team therefore the theme of the conference was extremely relevant to me. On the second day of the conference there was panel of representatives from various livestock production sectors in Australia who presented the industries' handling of animal welfare issues to date. This was a thought provoking session in which we were asked to evaluate for ourselves whether we felt satisfied with each of the industries' progress in this area. I thought about why animal welfare matters to me; as a consumer, a person, and someone who works in animal production science. This also sparked discussion with other attendees from New Zealand comparing the progress in our animal production industries. Soon after the conference I attended a workshop focused on animal welfare in the New Zealand dairy industry and enjoyed contributing ideas influenced by what I had learnt at the conference.

TRAVEL REPORT FOR AGRESEARCH ANIMAL GENOMICS AWARD Mallory Crookenden, PhD Student, DairyNZ

The NZSAP AgResearch Genomics travel award supported my attendance at the Australasian Genomics Technologies Association (AGTA) conference. The AGTA conference was held in Auckland during October (9th-12th), 2016. The AGTA conference is Australasia's leading genomics technologies conference. It showcased '—omics' research across multiple disciplines and across a wide range of topics. This conference is also well-attended by industry representatives, providing a valuable link to the industry in the areas of next generation sequencing (NGS) and genomics.

The conference provided a great opportunity to meet scientists and fellow students who also work with NGS technologies. This conference was held in partnership with the New Zealand Next Generation Sequencing Conference, and attracted researchers from all over Australasia. Additionally, this conference provided the opportunity to engage with industry representatives from companies that provide and develop NGS services. This provides exposure to leading technologies and methods that can be used to conduct genomics research.

The range of topics and technologies covered by the speakers provided a valuable learning experience. Several talks were concerned with animal genetics including regulatory elements in livestock, SNP Chips in sheep for disease markers, and bovine milk QTLs. Seminars were not limited to livestock and included talks on genetically modified crops, the genetics of oysters, and transcriptomics in tiger prawns. Research on human genetics also covered a wide range of technologies and disciplines including transcriptomics of breast cancer and personalised medicine, founder population genetics and disease susceptibility, the genetics of dwarfism and

sex development disorders, and the use of exosomal transcriptomics for identifying RNA biomarkers of neurodegenerative disease.

During my PhD I have had the opportunity to use transcriptomics techniques including RNAseq and miRNAseq, both of which were discussed at the conference. This helped me to complete the final chapter of my PhD, which dealt with RNAseq. Furthermore, exposure to how these technologies are used for research in humans provides an indication for areas for advancement in livestock research with the use of '—omics' techniques. As such, this conference was thought provoking and a wonderful opportunity to engage with people across all '—omics' disciplines.

President's Report

Key points:

- The NZSAP objectives are:
 - o To provide an organisation to bring about active collaboration among those involved in the science of producing food, fibre and other products from livestock.
 - o To provide an annual meeting for members which will encourage both intra- and interdisciplinary exchange and discussion of findings.
 - o To assist young people in a manner which develops an interest in the science of food and fibre production.
 - o To provide visions for the future of animal production in New Zealand.
 - o To promote the value of science in the development of animal production.
 - o To take such action as may be deemed necessary to foster improvement in animal production.
- These objectives are being met and some of the key aspects that indicate the achievement of the objectives are:
 - o Promoting collaboration through the annual conference.

- O Being forward looking in nurturing young members, especially through the Young Member Award.
- o Developing new ideas for animal production through the research that is carried out.
- o Promoting the value of science through the research carried out and through advocacy of science and the activity on other committees with which members are involved.
- NZSAP in association with NZGA and NZGT underwrote the Hill Country Symposium held in Rotorua in April 2016, 320 delegates attended this successful event. An output from this symposium will be a position paper which will provide the foundation for a road map for future hill country research. This position paper will be presented to organisations including B+LNZ, DINZ, NZ Sheep & Beef Council, MBIE, and Regional Councils by the farmer representatives with support from scientists.
- During the past year the Society has assumed its usual activities including:
 - o administration of the awards including the travel awards and those presented at the annual conference
 - o publication of the conference proceedings
 - o continued development of the Occasional Publications
 - o publication of a newsletter
 - o organising the annual conference in association with the Australian Society of Animal Production
 - Living Legend addresses of which the fourth one is to be presented by Dr Graham Barrell at this 2016 conference
- Young Members Award applications have increased. This year there was 19 abstracts submitted.
- Vote of thanks to the members of the 2015-16 Management Committee of the NZ Society of Animal Production.
- Also acknowledgement of representatives for the Society:
 - o Karin Schutz National Animal Welfare Advisory Committee
 - o Penny Back Spragg Agricultural Trust
 - o John McEwan AgResearch Genomics Award Committee
 - o Grant Edwards, Steve Morris & Mark Illston Hill Country Symposium Committee
- Currently 224 paid members, with 427 in the member database. This indicates approximately 200 unpaid members which the NZSAP Management Committee intends to remove from the membership in the forthcoming year.
- Membership numbers have shown a decline on previous year which reflects the continued downwards trend in membership over the past 30 years (1980's there was 600 members of the Society). This parallels a decline in the number of animal scientists and a decline in funding for animal science.

- Sponsorship: Otago Science Fair. Under advice from John McEwan and Grant Shackell NZSAP continued sponsorship of the Otago Science Fair. The continuation of this sponsorship will be reviewed by the Management Committee in the next 12 months.

Treasurer's report

Presented by Thomas Lopdell.

Hard copies of the Annual Financial report for the year ended 31 December 2015 were made available at the meeting for the members attending the AGM.

Key points:

- Revenue of \$65,202 which is approximately \$2,000 down on previous year. Expenditure \$48,342 which is down from 2014. This resulted in a net surplus, after impairment of investments of \$14,196.
- Main items of note in revenue were:
 - o Conference income of \$2,893 which was up on previous year.
 - o Interest similar to previous year
 - o Proceedings sales are down from previous year by approximately \$3,000, but Occasional Publication sales increased by approximately \$4,000 from previous year.
 - o No longer receive any income from SciQuest, now that the Proceedings are open access.
- Main items of note in expenditure were:
 - o Audit fees are up by approximately \$500 on last year.
 - O Awards substantially decreased. Nearly \$18,000 less monies were awarded in 2015 than in 2014.
 - o Publications and printing costs were significantly down from 2014.
- Closing equity of \$652,623.
 - o Total Assets: \$675,670 which is comprised of Current Assets of \$63,919 and Non-current assets of \$611,571.
 - o Total liabilities have increased by approximately \$1,000.

- Murray Woolford Young Dairy Scientist Award
 - There is no award criteria yet, and there has not yet been sufficient interest to award a substantial amount of money.

Move that the treasurer's annual financial report as circulated be accepted as an accurate record of the Society's accounts.

- 61 Abstracts were received for the 2016 Proceedings. Of this, 17 were rejected or withdrawn leaving 44 that were accepted and included in the Proceedings.
- The 2016 Proceedings comprises 16 Brief Communications, 29 full communications and the invited Living Legend address, making 45 papers in total plus the Presidential Address.
- Thank-you to the reviewers.
 - o Particularly those that are prompt.
 - o The best reviews provide both positive, as well as negative feedback.
 - o It is requested that reviewers remove their identification from word files especially using tracked changes. This will allow anonymity to be maintained.
 - o If using tracked changes make sure that reviewers also provide a recommendation report.
- The job of the Editor is to make the paper look good, maintain the style of the Proceedings, and to publish the Proceedings.
- Suggestions for authors preparing manuscripts for future Proceedings.
 - o Format your paper for the NZSAP Proceedings.
 - o The Editors suggestions are intended to be useful and are directed at improving the quality of the manuscript and maintaining format. Authors should implement the Editors suggestions.
